GENERAL

- The Guam Office of Highway Safety provides funding and materials for motorcycle education and training programs.
- No agency has lead responsibility for motorcycle safety.
- Guam does not have an active motorcycle advisory committee.
- Motorcycle crashes are not a priority crash problem in Guam.
- Guam does not have a motorcycle safety plan, and motorcycle safety is not included in the Strategic Highway Safety Plan.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

- Guam does not have any state run rider education and training programs.
- Guam does not have a *Sharing the Road* program.
- Information about sharing the road with motorcycles is included in Guam’s driver manual but not in the curriculum for new drivers.

PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT

- Guam requires motorcyclists under 18 to wear helmets.

IMPAIRED MOTORCYCLING

- All of Guam’s impaired driving mobilization campaigns include motorcyclists.

RESOURCES AND FUNDING

- Guam has not received a 2010 Motorcyclist Safety Grant.
